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News from the Grounds Committee

The Grounds Committee has been busy since early spring planning for improvements to the ground level landscaping and the third floor putting green area. We asked a company called Land Stewards to put together a plan to renovate many of the ground floor landscaping beds. Land Stewards is an ecologically based landscape firm which focuses on environmentally appropriate and sustainable plantings. With the exception of some front entrance improvements there have been no major investments in the landscaping in 15 years, so the scope of work is extensive. They provided us with a comprehensive plan encompassing 8 different zones on the first floor which we can implement in phases over the next few years, starting with the areas in greatest need of renovation. The Landscaping Committee, the Board, and management have been reviewing and prioritizing the plans and hope to start work on 2 of the beds this fall.



The Committee has also been planning improvements to the 3rd floor roof park, focusing on the very tired and virtually unused putting green area, which was originally scheduled for replacement in 2017. Plans are in the works to pull up the putting green, install gravel and/or pavers, and create a seating area including a fire pit! The fire pit will feature an automatic turn-off timer as a safety precaution. The furniture and the fire pit have been ordered and the Committee is weighing the options for the appropriate hardscaping.

Looking to next year, in addition to continuing the renovations of the ground floor beds, the Committee hopes to start to replace some of the grassy areas on the 3rd/4th floor roof park with meadow plantings as recommended in the plans by Roof Meadows.

Self Parking 2.0

The community transitioned from valet service to self-parking in 2020 with a mix of assigned and unassigned parking spaces. While many residents enjoyed their assigned spaces, this model prevented the community from utilizing the full capacity of the garage. Dependence on the unpaved overflowed lot was at a high level. After recently adopting a first-come-first-served approach for all parking spaces, the garage now has excess capacity, typically 45-50 empty spaces each night. Also, utilization of the overflow area dropped by 50% and there is greater capacity for visitor parking.



The executive board consulted with professionals and is now evaluating the requirements to pave the overflow lot, which includes a stormwater management plan that is acceptable to the PWD and obtaining permits and approvals from the City. While this could be a protracted process, it is possible to install parking management equipment for the visitor parking area sooner. This could facilitate a policy change to allow guest parking overnight, which is one of the goals. It has been a long road to finding the right formula for self-parking. Thank you for your continued patience throughout this process.

A New Neighbor?



West Highland Holdings, the owners of a surface parking lot at 933 N. Penn Street, between Rivers Casino and WFS, presented the details of their plan to build a 196 unit

apartment building to the NLNA zoning committee as part of a Civic Design Review (CDR). Plans call for a 7 story building with 57 parking spaces, 66 bicycle stalls, and a courtyard and roof deck for residents, but no commercial space. Plans also include a public outdoor space along the river including seating, paths, and a shade canopy, although those plans won't be part of the initial construction.

The final CDR with the city of Philadelphia was October 5th and their recommendations, along with those of NLNA, will be forwarded to L&I. Check out

Ben Franklin Bridge Renovation

The Ben Franklin Bridge is certainly a focal point of the view from WFS, so we've all noticed a flurry of construction activity on the bridge over the last year. So what are they doing?

The majority of the work to be completed consists of repairs to steel components on the suspended spans, painting, and installing a dehumidification system for the main cables. Dehumidification works by blowing very dry air into the cable at a low pressure with the goal of reducing the relative humidity to a level where it stems corrosion of the steel.

The steel repairs include the replacement of critical components of the suspension system. Access for the work on the suspended spans includes underbridge platforms, visible from

WFS, that will also provide containment for the painting operations.



The work also includes repairs to reinforced concrete and steel members, rehabilitation of the north and south walkways, and what will probably be most noticeable to WFS residents, the replacement of the decorative lighting.

The Ben Franklin opened to traffic in July 1926 and took 4 1/2 years to build, Until 1929, it held the distinction of being the world's longest suspension bridge. The renovations are expected to be completed by December 2024.
